Celebrating the life of our late, beloved Queen Elizabeth

iving in Sneyd Park gives ✓us the opportunity to stroll among some of the oldest preserved trees in Bristol and experience nature at its

best. It was with this in mind that I took great pleasure in supporting the planting of a new tree on the Downs near the Stoke Hill war memorial.



The tree is an English oak, which is extremely fitting as it was planted to mark the Platinum Jubilee of Her late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. The planting was a little late but we got there eventually! We felt it was appropriate for SPRA to celebrate the Queen's life in this way as her 70 years on the throne coincided with our organisation's 55th anniversary.

It was fantastic to have quite a few people come to watch the planting and witness the beginning of a new life that will hopefully endure for many years. The tree we planted was about 13 years old

and 4 metres tall; it has a long way to go to reach the dizzy heights of some other oaks in Sneyd Park, but everything has to start somewhere! The oldest oak in Sneyd Park is about 800 years old and there are many of 400-500 years.

I must mention my gratitude to John Atkinson from Bristol City Council who supported me in getting this tree planted - believe me, with permissions and financing that wasn't easy! In due course I will put up a plaque with suitable wording to celebrate the occasion. Alan Jenkinson Vice Chair

A highly sensitive matter

Van dwellers and caravans on The Downs: residents' observations

We continue to hear from members on this matter and are still pursuing the mayor of Bristol and Darren Jones (the MP for Bristol North West) about the situation.

John Goulandris and Henry Michallat – the Stoke Bishop ward's representatives on Bristol City Council – have been successful in securing the removal of 19 or more abandoned caravans at the top of Parrys Lane and Saville Road. If local residents believe a caravan has been abandoned, they can email details, plus a photo (which helps to identify the van in question) to John or Henry, who will send it on to Neighbourhood Enforcement (NE). Alternatively residents can contact NE directly.

NE usually sends someone out within seven days to check the caravan in question. If they believe it to be abandoned, they will place an 'enforcement to remove' order on it, and this tends to lead to removal within 14 days.



Hedges... again! Please take note...

As we have written about several times in our newsetters, we are very fortunate in our environment in Sneyd Park.

Even when the ground is saturated and walking in the woods and the nature reserve is not so easy, it is still pleasant to walk around the area on the pavements and paths.

However, as we have mentioned before (more than once) this can be difficult when hedges are allowed to grow over the pavement. It is now the very beginning of the growing season and the time when hedges can be cut back. If they are cut back now, by the summer they will be green once more.

The owner or occupier of a property has a legal responsibility (Highways Act 1980 section154) to ensure that the public highway adjacent to a property is not obstructed by vegetation from their property. A person pushing a pram or wheelchair should be able to walk unobstructed along the pavement. When parked cars

are added to the equation (sometimes parking with two wheels on the pavement) the situation becomes even more difficult.

Please go and have a look at your hedge, and please encourage your neighbours to do the same. No one wants to see a situation where an owner is reported to the council, which has the powers and duty to see that the hedge is cut.

Please help keep Sneyd Park a pleasant and safe place to walk around. *Chris Byrne*



Community SpeedWatch: your local group of volunteers

You may have seen a small group of people in hi-vis jackets standing at the junction of Rockleaze/ Circular Road/Ivywell Road with a speed gun and a clipboard. What you were witnessing is the most recent location in our neighbourhood for a group of volunteers to monitor vehicle speeds, in an agreement with the police.

Community SpeedWatch (CSW) is a partnership between the community and the police with the primary aim of making drivers more aware of speed limits, right across the Avon and Somerset Constabulary area. Our local CSW branch of CSW, Stoke Bishop and Westbury, is a group of nine individuals, all approved by Avon & Somerset Constabulary.

CSW has been operating in this part of Bristol since December 2015, and currently has approved sites on Coombe Lane, Stoke Lane, Reedley Road, Stoke Hill, Rockleaze/Circular Road, Parrys Lane, Bell Barn Road, Old Sneed Avenue, Shirehampton Road,

Eastfield Road, Henleaze Road, Passage Road (in Westbury village), Chock Lane and Canford Lane. Some we check more than others, and we endeavour to visit four sites each month.

Avon & Somerset Constabulary is fully committed to supporting CSW. Sometimes we have a PCSO present and sometimes a PC. The latter has the power to stop motorists, check documents and issue warnings and, if need be, fines.

I have lived on Rockleaze for 10 years and every day witness excessive speed, even close to children cycling, walkers, joggers and other road users.

Yes, we are operating in an area where we know many people, but we have received nothing but support from them.
